CONFIDENTIAL MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE AERONAUTICAL AUTHORITIES OF THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION AND THE REPUBLIC OF SINGAPORE

- Delegations representing the aeronautical authorities of the Russian Federation and the Republic of Singapore met in Singapore on 28 February and 1 March 2013 for air services consultations on the Air Transport Agreement between the Government of the Republic of Singapore and the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, signed in Singapore on 14 February 1969 ("the Agreement"), as amended.
- The consultations were held in a cordial and friendly atmosphere reflecting the friendly relations between the two countries. The delegation lists are attached at Appendix 1.
- 3 The delegations have agreed as follows:

1 ANNEX I TO THE AGREEMENT

Annex I to the Agreement, including amendments thereto, shall be deleted and replaced by the new Annex I attached at Appendix 2.

II DESIGNATION OF AIRLINES

5 Both delegations agreed that there will be no limitation on the number of airlines designated by each Contracting Party for the purpose of operating all agreed services connecting a given point in its territory and a given point in the territory of the other Contracting Party.

III TRAFFIC RIGHTS AND FREQUENCIES

The designated airlines of Russia and Singapore shall be entitled to operate full third and fourth freedom traffic rights for scheduled international passenger and/or cargo services between Russia and Singapore on the routes specified in Annex I of the Agreement, with no restrictions on frequency, capacity and aircraft type.

- The designated airlines of Russia and Singapore shall be entitled to operate full fifth freedom traffic rights for scheduled international passenger and/or cargo services on the routes specified in Annex I of the Agreement, up to 10 weekly frequencies for each Contracting Party, with any aircraft type.
- 8 The Russian delegation informed that the Russian Federation took the decision to remove the limitation on the frequencies and the number of foreign designated airlines for passenger and/or cargo operations to/from Vladivostok.

IV COOPERATIVE ARRANGEMENTS

- In operating or holding out the agreed services on the routes specified in Annex I to the Agreement, the designated airlines of Russia and Singapore shall be permitted to enter into cooperative marketing arrangements such as blocked-space or code-sharing arrangements, with:
- (a) an airline or airlines of the same Contracting Party;
- (b) an airline or airlines of the other Contracting Party; and
- (c) an airline or airlines of a third country,

provided that,

- (i) all airlines in such arrangements hold the appropriate authority to operate on the routes and segments concerned; and
- (ii) in respect of any tickets sold, the airline makes it clear to the purchaser at the point of sale which airline will actually operate each sector of the service and with which airline or airlines the purchaser is entering into a contractual relationship.
- Notwithstanding paragraph 9 of this Memorandum, there shall not be any limitation on the points in Russia for code-sharing arrangements for marketing airlines.
- Where a designated airline operates the agreed services under codesharing arrangements as the operating airline, and where there is a limitation on frequency entitlements, the operated frequency shall be counted against the frequency entitlements of the Contracting Party designating the said airline. Frequency offered by a designated airline acting as the marketing airline on the code-share services operated by other airlines shall not be counted against the

- (d) protection of airlines from prices that are low due to unfair competition.
- (4) Each Contracting Party may require notification or filing of tariffs proposed by the designated airlines of the other Contracting Party for carriage to or from its territory. Such notification or filing may be required not more than thirty (30) days before the proposed date of introduction. In special cases, this period may be reduced."
- 13 The modifications to the Agreement contained in paragraph 12 of this Memorandum shall come into provisional effect pending the exchange of notes by the Contracting Parties through the diplomatic channel in accordance with Article 18 of the Agreement.

VI CO-TERMINAL AND OWN STOPOVER RIGHTS

- While operating an agreed service on a specified route, the designated airlines of the Contracting Parties may, in addition to the rights specified in Article 2 of the Agreement, exercise co-terminal and own stopover rights. There will be no exercise of cabotage.
- 15 The designated airlines of the Russian Federation shall be entitled to start and terminate operations at different points in the territory of the Russian Federation.

VII OTHER MATTERS

- 16 The Singaporean delegation proposed the following:
- (a) to increase the weekly frequencies for the exercise of fifth freedom traffic rights by the designated airlines of the Contracting Parties to 21 weekly frequencies one year from the date of signature of this Memorandum;
- (b) to allow the designated airlines of the Contracting Parties to exercise seventh freedom traffic rights with no restrictions on frequency, capacity and aircraft type in respect of cargo services; and
- (c) to allow the designated airlines of the Contracting Parties to be permitted to use surface modes of transport without restriction in conjunction with its international passenger and/or cargo air services.

VIII ENTRY INTO FORCE

- 18 This Memorandum shall enter into force on the date of its signature.
- This Memorandum shall be treated as confidential by the aeronautical authorities of the Russian Federation and the Republic of Singapore, although its contents may, as necessary, be disclosed by the aeronautical authorities of the Russian Federation and the Republic of Singapore to their respective designated airlines.
